






### **Number of chicken and farmers** (Commercial farm, layer and broiler)




#### Average poultry feed prices (USD/kg)<sup>2</sup>

## Challenges and opportunities in the Rwandan poultry sector



Poultry feed (incl. maize, soy, premix, vitamins, and minerals) is scarce, expensive, and often of low quality. In addition, there is insufficient storage capacity. As such, there is strong demand for 1) innovative substitutes of maize and soy, 2) feed storage facilities and 3) other feed components such as vitamins.



#### **TRAININGS**

In Rwanda, technical and/or specialized knowledge on poultry is often missing. Moreover, poultry farmers often lack management skills needed to successfully run their businesses. Considering the financial position of farmers, there is an opportunity to work with development partners.



Although the demand is high, there are challenges throughout the chicken meat processing value chain, such as insufficient slaughterhouses and processing units, as well as a lack of quality packaging material for poultry meat.



#### **EXPORT**

The market in DRC is an interesting and rapidly growing market. From 2017 to 2019, export of eggs increased from 615 MT to 1661 MT due to the growing market in DRC. There is a strong and growing demand from DRC for eggs, feed and hatcheries.



#### **HATCHERIES**

The demand for day old chicks is high and there is low availability of locally produced day-old chicks. New hatcheries could offer an alternative for imported chicks.

**VACCINES** 

There is insufficient supply of affordable vaccines and essential veterinary drugs to poultry farmers. There is a strong demand for a consistent and affordable supply of vaccines and drugs.
